It was two days of talks, panels, and science fun. The conference, modeled after many that Susan Gerbic has helped organize across the country over the years, was somewhat informal. Neither registration nor fee was needed! People could just drop in and show up. The festivities began on Friday night with a visit to a local brewpub, Steelbender. A dozen or so of us arrived and hung out, chatting about skeptical topics over craft beers.

And because most of the event was recorded by Adrienne Hill and/or Susan, the talks and sessions will be available for all to see in the next few weeks. 





May 15th, 2024, NMSR Meeting: Keith Gilbert, "Counterintuitive Corners of The Mind"

Our own Keith Gilbert has penned a non-fiction book titled "Counterintuitive Corners of The Mind." It is a guide on "how to hone critical thinking skills in our wobbly world." It is available on Amazion and Kindle, <u>https://www.amazon.com/Counterintuitive-Corners-</u>



Keith described his motivation for the book. He took a course in Critical Thinking at UNM, at the philosophy department, which has dozens of professors. But the class was taught by a graduate student, who spent the entire semester reading from Plato's Republic. Yes, that included critical thinking, but from 2500 years ago. New approach is needed for the times we live in, he said.

Keith described how we use our intuition (basically our library of experiences) to make decisions, and how we often make the wrong decisions. Critical Thinking and skepticism offers a pathway to making better decisions. Skeptics are not cynics, or "Nattering nabobs of negativism" (the description crafted by former vice-president Spiro Agnew). Keith described the scientific method and hypothesis testing, and noted that every theory is temporary. Strong theories last longer than weak theories. He the described several examples of counter-intuitive thinking, mitigate and how to uncertainty and counter-intuitive situations. Hummingbirds, cold fusion and more were explored. Keith offered the GRASP mnemonic as a guide to critical thinking.



Keith provided several examples of counterintuitive thinking. Here's one regarding a taut line:

An inelastic wire is stretched taut between the goalposts of an American football field. The wire is at ground level. Its length is ~ 110m. Next, we add 1.0m to the wire. Standing at the midpoint (55 m), the wire is lifted until again taut. What is the largest of these that can walk under the wire @ midpoint? a) Man (2m), b) Camel (3m), c) Giraffe (6m). Most people presented with this would intuit : "A man could just walk under"! But if you do the math, the surprising answer is c) Giraffe! The height $h = \sqrt{(55.5^2 - 55^2)} = 7.4$ meters!

Adrienne Hill kicked off the event with a presentation titled *Not a Ghost of a Chance: A Spirited Journey into Ghostly Photography*, which provided an excellent overview of ghost photos, from Spiritualism-era double exposures to present-day ghost hunters' "orb" photos. She began with a personal story of a spooky, seemingly supernatural encounter that had a skeptical explanation, and ended with Wikipedia statistics. Adrienne helpfully provided color photocopies of her slides afterwards.

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I was next up, discussing a moral panic / rumor / conspiracy that I'd investigated several years ago, the **Blue Whale game**. It was, allegedly, a sinister online game that teens and young adults were becoming involved in, which led to dangerous behavior—and, eventually—suicide. I wrote about it for Skeptical Inquirer magazine and covered it on my podcast, Squaring the Strange. Though some people in the audience had seen my work on it, several said they'd forgotten important details and appreciated the update and review.

After a lunch break **Celestia Ward** took the stage to discuss **Creativity and Critical Thinking: What Can Art Teach About Skepticism?** Drawing (heh) upon her diverse backgrounds as an artist, public relations coordinator, and skeptic, she examined the intersection between art, psychology, and critical thinking, and made excellent points about how part of learning to draw is training yourself to see in new ways, just as critical thinking involves learning to see the world in new ways.



Then local investigative reporter Larry



Barker took the stage. While his name may not be familiar to those outside New Mexico, he has spent decades in local TV news (currently KRQE News 13). In his talk he showed and discussed several news stories he'd done in conjunction with either Dave or myself, on several

local legends and myths ranging from the Aztec UFO crash and Bigfoot to the chupacabra. Though the majority of his work is exposing government corruption—and not, for example, debunking ghosts —he highlighted some of the parallels between investigative journalism and skeptical investigation; "We can suspect whatever we like, but if we can't prove it we don't run it." Finally, **Frank Etscorn** took the stage to offer an informative and humorous take on medical quackery. A psychologist by trade, he gave a fastpaced lecture/ standup rant on myriad medical misinformation and mischief including homeopathy. Sputtering equal parts incredulity and outrage in his trademark Kentucky accent, Frank took on—and took down—a litany of bogus remedies from Therapeutic Touch to "detox" quackery.



The day concluded with a panel discussion about UFOs including **Susan Gerbic**, **Dave Thomas**, and **Brian Dunning**.

Day Two

Sunday kicked off with **Susan Gerbic's** talk *Telling Stories with Wikipedia*. In it she discussed the Guerrilla Skeptic on Wikipedia project and highlighted the human side to some well-known stories, such as the men behind the Hale-Bopp comet discovery and other notable-but-overlooked scientists. She ended with a call for help for the GSoW project—volunteers always needed!

Dave Thomas gave an illuminating and insightful overview of flat earth theories. He discussed the foundation of some of the beliefs, and

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offered clear point-by-point rebuttals of some of the most common flat earth memes. I confess that the math lost me in a few instances, but he managed to make the basics understandable and showed several examples of flat earth follies with simple science experiments. Dave, longtime founder and head of the local skeptics group New Mexicans for Science and Reason, provided some entertainment and education between some of the sessions, including science experiments that wowed even veteran skeptics and amateur scientists.

After lunch a second panel discussion was convened, ably anchored by **Celestia** separating me from **Matt Loftus**, aka the Credible Hulk. We each gave our takes and insights into PR, Outreach, and Social Media for Skeptics.



Matthew Lee Loftus, Celestia Ward, Ben Radford Ethnohistorian, archaeologist, author, and cohost (along with Ruben Arellano Tlakatekatl) of the Tales from Aztlantis podcast, Kurly Tlapoyawa spoke on *The Fight Against Pseudoarcheology*.

Drawing from his own experiences, he described a fascinating (and funny) case of a supposedly ancient Maya symbol incorporated into



both New Age and academic circles, as well as bogus history about Black Olmecs promoted by our mutual alma mater, the University of New Mexico. Kurly's efforts to bring science and history to the matter were met with unfounded and offensive accusations of racism, though through persistence he was able to have an error-riddled journal article retracted—only to find it published elsewhere unchanged.

Brian Dunning closed the weekend with a screening of his most recent film *The UFO Movie THEY Don't Want You To See*. Many in the audience



had seen it at least once; I'd seen it twice (full disclosure: I'm an Associate Producer) and each viewing got better; I noticed nuances and details I'd missed before. After the film ended Brian did a short

Q&A, then discussed the overlapping (and often opposing) demands that filmmakers have. Films can be educational, profitable, or popular. Ideally, of course, they are all three, but as a practical matter filmmakers must give careful thought to how to devote (very) limited resources to balance these competing interests.



The crowd was modest but enthusiastic, and as it was the first of its kind in New Mexico, about what we expected. While outreach to the public is part of the mission, it's also to make and renew connections within the skeptical community. Even many of us veteran skeptics learned new things from the talks and each other; to give only one of many examples, due to Dave's talk I am armed with quick and simple replies to flat earth misinformation. Due in part to Celestia's PR acumen, we got a mention on KRQE News 13.

In between and after the conference there was a bit of time to relax and adventure; Celestia and Brian and I visited a famous "miracle" staircase in Santa Fe, then made our way to the Meow Wolf art installation nearby.

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Thanks are due to organizing work by Susan, Adrienne, Celestia, and Dave. Even scaled-down events like this take significant planning and preparation, and we couldn't have done it without them. And, of course all the speakers who kindly donated their time and expertise to make the event a success. More SkeptiCamps are planned, possibly in your area, so instead of—or in addition to—larger conferences, they are a good place to share passions for science, critical thinking, and skepticism.
